ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES INTEGRATED SYSTEM INTEGRATION

Road Transport Department RTD) would like to clarify that, enforcement management to ensure the safety of road users to comply with the law, is a priority for all law enforcement agencies.

Recently, the department has held discussions with the Royal Malaysian Police (RMP) and the Land Public Transport Commission (LPTC). Through these discussions, the three enforcement agencies are committed to improving the management system of enforcement towards being more comprehensive.

In this case, enforcement information sharing between the three law enforcement agencies is a requirement, in line with the National Blue Ocean Strategy (NBOS). Currently, RTD is using the *my*SIKAP computing system, while the RMP and the LPTC have their own system in carrying out their respective highway enforcement operations.

Therefore, the agreement has been made for, existing integration system being implemented in real time (actual time) at this time needs to be improved, especially the procedure of blacklisting drivers, owners and vehicles. This matter is important so users who are on the road are those who are competent.

In addition, the discussion also found that there was a need for two-way information sharing for traffic offenses by road users who receive summons or notice from the RMP to the RTD. It aims to enable the RTD to monitor and take precautions as necessary towards traffic offenders under the 1987 Road Transport Act.

Meanwhile, the LPTC will also get the latest data and information so that immediate action can be taken against bus companies and taxi operators to comply with the terms and conditions set before starting operation.

To follow up on traffic offenses to operators and drivers of commercial vehicles, RTD and the RMP will carry out the sharing of information on a regular basis to the LPTC until the development of the integrated system integration of the three law enforcement agencies have been completed.

In the meantime, Malaysian Administrative Modernization and Management Planning Unit (MAMPU) will also be helpful to look at the overall capacity needs of building an integrated systems integration of enforcement agencies.
